Welcome to Oakwood Daffodil's 34rd annual listing of Midwestern-raised, bred, and acclimatized daffodils. I have grown daffodils on a singular basis since 1971 and bred them on a regular basis since 1976. I can proudly state that I have the largest collection of Narcissus hybrids in diversity, quality and quantity, in the United States. I have tried to offer the American gardener and daffodil lovers worldwide the greatest chance of enjoying their favorite flower. Midwestern daffodils will do better in most of the USA and better than those from other climates and countries. While emphasis is on Midwestern Daffodils, I am listing bulbs from Australia, New Zealand and the United Kingdom too.

My daffodil list is sent out by email; and snail mail, to those who require that service. Bulbs are essentially dug to order in late May and June, and then shipped in late September/ October.

This last year has been hard for me as my second year as a widower. End stage diabetes, osteoarthritis and spinal disease have been traumatic and difficult on me. But I've not given up. I am continuing on with the daffodils. Including selling bulbs to our customers and advancing their qualities through continued breeding and selections here.

I'm proud to announce our first Pannill Award to Cinnamon Ring, given this year at the National Show. Also a magnificent bloom of Juergen, 1 Y-Y won the Gold at Nashville last week and Memphis today. Hopefully it too, will join the ranks with Cinnamon Ring. I'm reintroducing Tristan's Memory 2 Y-Y this year. It already has a good show record of Gold Awards will get consideration soon. It's up to you the exhibitors to insure this.

Julie Martin has been my family care giver and still is for me, while providing most of the work on the daffodils and helping provide rehab care on her oldest granddaughter Maci for her post surgery on an aggressive brain tumor Without Julie there would not be an Oakwood Daffodils. This year's list has new Reed introductions and continues include list Larry's Wier's offerings at the end of mine. I suggest you use the Hyperlink to Daffseek to view photos of these flowers on line to help with your order decisions.

Significant advances in many areas of color, form and size are being made at Oakwood. Last year's repeat advances include a beautiful show quality 1 P-R and a deeply colored show quality 8 Y-R using my hybrids exclusively as parents. We now have a perfectly flat smooth 1Y-Y with wide non incurving petals, also more diverse 1 W-R's and 2W-R's.

Join us and savor out beauties. Help the daffodil world and the ADS grow stronger and show more of these attractive flowers. Please take note of the final dates for ordering bulbs as we try to stop digging by the end of June. Sorry no credit cards at this time. Orders are taken in sequence by date received.

- 1. All orders must be received by **July1st**, **2017** to be assured availability. **AFTER THAT DATE**, up until shipping has started, orders will be accepted and filled according to availability. You will receive an acknowledgment of your order as they are processed, either by e-mail or phone call if we have your e-mail address or phone number.
- 2. Please make checks payable to **OAKWOOD DAFFODILS**. We are sorry, but due to rising costs of credit card processing, we are unable to take any credit cards.
- Bulbs will be shipped via USPS unless otherwise specified, so please include your COMPLETE shipping address. We are basing our shipping charges on the cost of the USPS medium flat-rate box. This has been our most common box size over the last few years. As usual, we always give gratis bulbs with your orders. For those smaller orders, we will give additional free bulbs to compensate for the additional shipping charge. If you have any concerns or problems with this please let us know. This is being done to simplify the shipping expenses to you. Overseas shipping will be billed at cost, plus the phytosanitary certificate and inspection fees.
- 4. Bulb shipments will hopefully be finished by the third week of September; sooner, if possible. Please specify if you require a particular shipping date and we will do our best to accommodate.
- Visitors are welcome, but please make arrangements in advance to avoid disappointment due to variation in blooming or unfavorable weather.

- 7. The format used in this catalog lists the daffodil's registered name first. This is followed by its classification and color code, then its hybridizer and country of origin. After the description, the pedigree (seed parent x pollen parent) is listed, then its flowering time, and then the price for each bulb.
- 8. As a professional courtesy to our dear colleague, we include in our listing a special list of bulbs offered by Larry Wier; you can find it at the end of this list. Larry personally oversees the growing, packaging, and posting of his own bulbs. Please send your order and payment, and any questions, directly to Larry via his contact information included on his order form. Thank you.

CLERIC 2 W-YYW (Dr. John Reed, USA)

A very refined "White Collar "measuring division 2 by 2mm. Smooth wide overlapping petals are the backing for a light yellow trumpet shaped corona that has a wide band of white at its edge. Up facing with strong stems, every bloom fit for show. Named for its white collar, like a priests. Was Reed 98-26-20/4A

CRIMSON PRINCESS 2W-R (Dr. John Reed, USA)

A very large flower on medium strong stems with good poise and petal overlap. Good for Show or Garden. Was Reed 97-101-2

Magician x Candy Man Midseason \$25.00

DARKER SHADE 3Y-Y (Dr. John Reed, USA)

This is a strong growing tall flower with a strong stem, and outward facing poise. Originally I wanted to name it Honey Dew but the name was taken. It reminded me of the color of that melon not quite yellow or green. The color develops off from white initially. The form is similar to its pod parent Irish Mint. An intriguing and lovely bloom of medium size. Was Reed 98-125-10

Dr. POL 2W-O (Dr. John Reed, USA)

Named to honor a popular veterinarian in central Michigan. The star of a reality T.V show "The Incredible Dr. Pol". I've come to the admire him and enjoy his shows which aired its number 100 episode this year. Originally from Holland, his family and crew provide service to a large rural area. This is the first really strong growing 2W-O here. Its corona is of trumpet character. Very vigorous and free flowering and of show quality. Was Reed 98-32-10 **Name pending**

HAMPTON DELIGHT 1 W-Y (Dr. John Reed, USA)

Admired by an ADS member, it just had to be named for her town. Vigorous smooth, large blooms are shown with great poise and on strong stems that look very impressive. One of the best new introductions yet this year. Stock is still Scarce. Was Reed 97-129-1

IVORY WHITE 1YWW-W (Dr. John Reed, USA)

A most unusually colored trumpet. This large elegant flower opens an off white (Ivory) and as time passes the outer 1/3 of the petals develop a light yellow color. **Name pending**

JONNY QUEST 3Y-R (Dr. John Reed, USA)

These early brightly colored blooms have spoken to me for many years. Besides being a vigorous grower it appears to be an intermediate measuring 75mm across this year. The petals lay flat in a perfect plane angled to look at you. They are overlapping and a lemon yellow. The corona is tidy and pleasing. Overall a wonderful small flower 11-12 inches tall, flower Named for a popular T.V. cartoon hero in my child hood. Was Reed 98-14-1 **Name pending**

Cassopolis x Redlands II Early Midseason \$14.00

LAVENDER BELL 1Y-P (Dr. John Reed, USA)

From the cross that gave Pink Climax comes a full trumpet with a rolled, corona rimmed Very vigorous and healthy. The lavender colored trumpet is a perfect topping to the light yellow overlapping perianth. Exceedingly beautiful in my eyes. I love it. Unique in the yellow pink trumpets. Ample stock allows lower price. Was Reed 92-169-? **Name pending**

Quantasia x Fidelity Midseason \$16.00

LEMON BITONE 1 Y/W-Y (Dr. John Reed, USA)

I fell in love with this flower when I observed in my older 1993 seedling rows on the east side of the spruce trees. Upon opening a light color becomes brilliant yellow as the petals develop a kind of alternation of white and yellow. Eventually the color becomes all yellow. Difficult for me to describe. See my photo on Daffseek. The flowers are large held on strong stems with overlapping petals. The long trumpet looks upward. For show or garden.

MANDARIN ORANGE 2W-O (Dr. John Reed, USA)

A very smooth intermediate. The long corona is a pastel orange and very tubular. Its petals are inherited from Quench that are always broad and smooth. Color is variable with water and heat giving the best blooms. Every bloom fit for a winning show. Was Reed 95-109-1 Name pending

ORANGE PICOTEE 3W-YO (Dr. John Reed, USA)

The most distinctive flower for the cross that gave me My Sweet Heart. The corona is very small with an edging pleated in shape with alternating colors. Strong stems, smaller flowers excellent poise.

Named for the father of all the barn cats at Oakwood. A smooth, large shorter bloom with overlapping petals, but not too wide. The corona is of medium color and well formed, It has strong stems and good poise. Was Reed 2000-16-1

Pike Lake x Irish Affair Midesason \$20.00

POKAGON 1 YYW-P (Dr. John Reed, USA)

An outstanding, large, impressive bloom held on tall strong stems beckon you. Strong neck. Very smooth flat perianth with broad overlapping segments. Named for the local Potawatomi Indian tribe. A WOW flower. Corona is a pinkish color.

ROCKET MAN 6Y-ORR (Dr. John Reed, USA)

To see it is to love it! Named for its appearances of a shooting rocket with up facing blooms, and the song made famous by Elton John. The main stock is at my other farm and will be dug this year. It's a very strong growing healthy flower. Blooms can color up strongly. Was Reed 85-38-5.

SIMPLICITY PATTERN 2W-P (Dr. John Reed, USA)

One of the better new pure colored 2 W-P's at Oakwood. Very well formed for show with wide smooth petals on medium strong stems. Protection and extra water will give better blooms in most seasons here, Named for a business in Niles, Michigan that made dress patterns. Was Reed 2000-60-1

The third and last selection form this cross, slow growing but healthy. Similar to Peaceful Hollow but distinctive.

SPOTLESS 2 W-W (Dr. John Reed, USA)

Very tall strong stems hold well-formed very white show blooms looking up at you. Good petal overlap but not excessive, Wide slower growing but healthy. Being used in my breeding to get longer stems for white trumpets that are on short stems. Named for a daffodil friend Bob Spotts. Was Reed 89-16-2 **Name pending**

Inverpolly x Misty Glen

STANDING TALL 2W-R (Dr. John Reed, USA)

Its name defines it. Most 2W-R flowers suffer with short stems, but this doesn't. From a cross of very red coronas this one stood out. It was saved to use in crosses due to its good attributes of stem, neck, poise and health. Was Reed 97-15-1 Name pending Magician x 87-94-3 Midseason \$18.00

YELLOW BRICK ROAD 2Y-P (Dr. John Reed, USA)

A bold deeply colored bloom. Very vigorous, healthy, floriferous. Strong stems, with large flowers, petals are a bronzy yellow and the pink corona is more brick/pink colored. As it was bred from Ruby Red the name seemed appropriate. Show, garden and breeding. Was Reed 95-65-1 **Name pending**

AL LAUREYS 3Y-R (Dr. John Reed, USA)

This is the finest small cupped 3Y-R I have flowered. Of smaller size, the smooth flat perianth segments are positioned in the same plane with excellent poise. Named for Al a friend that helped me so much with the daffodils for 10 years. Al was always there when I needed him. Though of slight build his heart was huge and the best! Was Reed 92-106-1.

Sabine Silk x Burning Bush?

ALL AMERICAN 2W-P (Dr. John Reed, USA)

Similar to Refrain but the cup is longer. Corona is variable in color which is more intensely pink or red in the best of seasons. Strong stems support the flower well. Petals overlap but not massively. They are smooth and in the same plane.

AMERICAN AFFAIR 2W-Y (Dr. John Reed, USA)

When this first flowered I was amazed at its quality. It was the best 2 W-Y I had ever seen. (See the photo in my 2016 ADS Journal ad, plus other later photos in Daff Seek) The corona is dramatically colored a bright yellow and the perianth is very white. Its smoothness is beyond other white yellow blooms I have flowered. This is a great show flower with excellent poise and petal overlap. Stems are really strong. I have flowered smoother show flowers since but without the tremendous impact this one has. Stock is still small with few to go this year. Was Reed 98-66-1

85-81-1 (Cyros x Helsal) x Irish Affair

AMERICAN DOLLAR 3W-W (Dr. John Reed, USA)

A stand-out that is almost perfectly round, small, and very white. I had been calling it Silver Dollar but that name was not available. A definite intermediate with massive, overlapping and smooth perianth segments that incurve. They are on strong stems that show a well formed show flower. A vigorous grower. Was Reed Seedling 98-125-4

[Irish Mint x 85-26-1 (Angel x Misty Glen)]

AMBERGRIS CAYE 1YYG-Y

A large unusually colored trumpet. Stems are strong but just medium tall. It is similar to its seed parent but more intensely colored. It is a show flower and breeder. It is very impressive with beautiful massive petal breadth and overlap.

Peter Ramsay and I made this cross at about the same time. This is probably the best early well-formed and colored show flower that I selected from the cross. Stock is still small.Was seedling 98-1-1.

A tall, robust, smooth yellow trumpet that shouts out that it is the best. Named for the Gold Medals won by American athletes in the last Olympics. Outstanding poise, overlap, smoothness, color and size make it easy to identify in the field. Was Reed 93-1-23.

Many show awards in the UK. Beautiful flowers here, with vigorous growth, and tall strong stems.

This was the best selection from the crosses made from Fragrant Rose x Culmination. It was also the latest flowering and the slowest to increase here, hence the name. Bright red open cups show well against very white, wide, smooth, overlapping petals and the flowers face upwards. Fertile. A must for late shows. Was Reed 90-95-2.

BACK FLASH 2W-YYO (Dr. John Reed, USA)

An excellent flower for show and garden. Vigorous. It may exhibit an orange rim at times. Was Reed 81-21-1. (Green Island x Flash Affair) Midseason \$5.00

BARNESGOLD 1Y-Y (B. S. Duncan, N. IRE,UK)

I prefer this of all of Brian's yellow trumpets. It is the parent of my best dark gold trumpet to date. Tall stems support rounded flowers with excellent poise.

(Golden Jewel x Midas Touch) Late Midseason \$ 5.00

BEAUTY REST 2W-P (Dr. John Reed. USA)

Registered in 2009 but has been neglected when preparing my catalog. Big blooms are held high on strong stems with excellent poise. The color of the corona is a very pure pink and the petals very white with good overlap and smoothness. A beautiful flower for show and garden. Reed Seedling 95-40-2

(Brian's Favorite x Lawless) Midseason \$ 6.00

BENTON HARBOR 2Y-W ((Dr. John Reed, USA)

On first flowering this was the best show quality reverse bicolor daffodil I had raised. Alas the stems are short and it has been seed sterile too. The wide over lapping petals are very contrasted compared to the corona. Strong stems support the large flowers well with a straight ahead poise. Was Reed 90-95-1

Fragrant Rose x Culmination Midseason \$ 24.00

BIG MO 1Y-Y (Dr. John Reed, USA)

The finest flower from a prolific small cross. Very smooth, large blooms verging on a subtle shade of orange as the flowers age. It has had good reviews from Ohio and New Zealand, too. Named for my father, M.O. Reed ("Mo") and the greatest United States battleship, The USS Missouri ("MO"). A top-quality show bloom. A slower increaser than its sibling, Dr. David Hough. Reed 83-40-1.

(Gold Bullion x Gold Convention) Midseason \$ 6.00

BIOMETRICS 2 Y-O (Richard & Elise Havens, USA)

Sibling to Flint Arrow and Velocity, but with a non-reflexed perianth registered as division 2. Intermediate show flower.

Jetfire x Gypsy Early Season \$ 7.00

BLAZING SADDLES 11a Y-O (Dr. John Reed, USA)

This was a prolific cross with many imposing flowers. Shown in a collection of seedlings at the 2009 Chicago National Show it was admired by many. Large flowers held on tall strong stems have petals of the highest show quality. The petals are lightly colored reflecting the seed parents breeding to get an orange perianth. Fertile both ways. Healthy grower and an impressive flower. Was Reed 98-146-1

88-99-1 (Colorama x Stylish) x Menehay Midseason \$ 32.00

BRIERGLASS 2W-GWW (John Lea, ENG,UK)

A very white round early show flower. Parent of David Adams from Charles Wheatley.

(Ashmore x Croila) Early Midseason \$4.00

BUCHANAN 6W-GWW (Dr. John Reed, USA)

A lovely, early, all-white for show and garden. While it changes colors, it usually can be shown as an all-white. Named for the Michigan town that I first practiced in. Stock is still small, a slow increaser, but healthy. Was Reed 84-101-2

(Broomhill x N. cyclamineus) Early Season \$12.00

BURNING BUSH 3Y-R (Brian S Duncan, NIre,UK)

A truly outstanding daffodil for the garden and show. Intense colors and long stems make it standout. Proving to be a good parent and an excellent show flower. Makes smaller bulbs. My favorite Brian Duncan daffodil.

[(Rockhill x Bunclody) x (Altruist x Ulster Bank)] Late Midseason

BURR OAK 2W-R (Dr. John Reed, USA)

A number of seedlings were planted adjacent to one of the great trees at Oakwood by my helpers when I had major health issues and was not able to do it myself. When they planted the bulbs they failed to make planting diagrams and used ink labels that faded quickly. This probably was a 1997 seedling, possibly related to Crimson Beauty. Evaluated over the years—this selection showed more staying power in bad weather, and overall superior qualities to its stem and flower. Originally called RED Oak by me, but the name was taken. It had smooth overlapping white petals all in the same plane held on tall strong stems above the foliage with glorious red cups. These qualities have been hard to get in 2 W-R daffodils. Stock is still small and it will be in demand for a long time. Was Reed seedling Red Oak. Never released till 2016.

Considered one of my best 3Y-Rs. It has **tall, strong** stems with excellent large show flowers. They are smooth with heavy substance and excellent poise. Was Reed 92-80-2.

BUTTER SILK 2Y-Y (Dr. John Reed, USA)

I was taken by this flower's bright yellow color and extreme petal smoothness when I first saw it, hence the name. It has excellent petal overlap and a strong medium length stem. Admired by Larry Weir at his place. It is giving excellent seedlings including my best ever pale 1Y-Y for show. Was seedling 92-22-1.

From the cross that gave American Hero, this daffodil is not formal enough for show but it beckons you with its intense color and tall stems, attracting people like a candy man does. Breeding intense color! Stock is still small. Was Reed 89-50-2.

CAPTAIN AMERICA 2W-R (Dr. John Reed, USA)

Appropriately named for a super hero. Tall stems and wide petals are a foil for an amazing large deep red cup. It can be shown. Striking in the garden. Pollen is fertile and occasionally sets seed, too. See DaffSeek photos. Wind protection gives smoother, taller blooms. The red color fades with time, especially in the sun. Was Reed 95-5-1.

(Cordial x Magician)

CARROT JUICE 10-0 (Dr. John Reed, USA)

I could not take my eyes off this when it first flowered. While smaller than average, its petals were a uniform shade of light orange. I could see no yellow in the petals with my eyes. This is not a suffusion or a sheen. While this is not a top show flower, it is showable at its best. It is a real color break and its color is being passed on to its seedlings which are of a higher quality, too! Was seedling 96-18-1.

[78-17-3N (Trumpet Call x Orange Way) x 82-108-4 (Zuni x Glenfarclas Early Mid-Season

CASSOPOLIS 2Y-R (Dr. John Reed, USA)

Possible my best 2Y-R, this is a well-engineered daffodil with an exemplary smooth very flat wide perianth supported by a strong stem and neck. A row of blooms is almost military-like in their bearing. Alas, the deep colored cylinder-like cup burns easily and needs protection for show. It can flush the petals with red at times. Named for a local Michigan town where I have purchased my Ford trucks. Was Reed seedling 82-200-3.

[(Air Marshall x Caracas) x Creagh Dubh]

ROYAL HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY SYSTEM OF DAFFODIL CLASSIFICATION

The classification of daffodils has changed many times over the years. The present system combines the RHS classification of thirteen divisions based on form and species heritage with Dr. Throckmorton's color coding from the American Daffodil Society. This combined system gives us a very useful tool for describing daffodils quickly. A single letter denotes a color and its appropriate location as found in the flower, first in the perianth and then in the corona. W=White Y=Yellow G=Green O=Orange R=Red P=Pink

For example: Arctic Gold is classified as a 1Y-Y. It is a trumpet daffodil with yellow petals and a yellow corona. Misty Glen is classified as a 2W-GWW. It is a large-cupped daffodil with white petals and a green-eyed white cup. First Born classified as a 6Y-GYP. It is a cyclamineus hybrid with swept-back, yellow petals and the corona has a greenish eye with a small transition of light yellow going to a deep pink color extending to the edge of the cup.

Division 1	Trumpet Daffodils: The trumpet (corona) is equal to, or longer than, the petal (perianth) segments.			
Division 2	Large-Cupped Daffodils: The cup (corona) is less than the length of the petals (perianth) but more than a third.			
Division 3	Small-Cupped Daffodils: The cup (corona) is equal to, or less than a third, of the petal (perianth) length.			
Division 4	Double Daffodils: This division is for all forms of double flowers where there is more than one set of petal or coronal segments, or both.			
Division 5	Triandrus Daffodils: hybrid daffodils that predominate with <i>N. triandrus</i> characteristics.			
Division 6	Cyclamineus Daffodils: hybrid daffodils that predominate with <i>N. cyclamineus</i> characteristics.			
Division 7	Jonquilla Daffodils: hybrid daffodils that predominate with N. jonquilla characteristics.			
Division 8	Tazetta Daffodils: hybrid daffodils that predominate with <i>N. tazetta</i> characteristics. The stems usually will have multiple flowers. Also known as poetaz daffodils.			
Division 9	Poeticus Daffodils: hybrid daffodils that predominate with <i>N. poeticus</i> characteristics.			
Division 10	Bulbocodium Daffodils: hybrid daffodils that predominate with <i>N. bulbocodium</i> characteristics.			
Division 11	Split-corona Daffodils: the cup (corona) that is split for more than a half of its length. This division has two subdivisions:			
	11a: Collar Daffodils have the corona segments opposite to the perianth segments.			
	11b: Papillion Daffodils have the corona segments alternating to the perianth segments			
Division 12	Miscellaneous Daffodils: those that cannot be classified within the preceding divisions.			
Division 13	Species Daffodils: those distinguished solely by botanical name—the wild ones.

His standards are very high and you can be sure that his flowers are superior, distinctive, and healthy. He has acquired some of Charles Wheatley's stocks and is introducing them, as well. I'm adding a five dollar flat rate fee for shipping as the costs keep going up. THE BULBS LISTED BELOW ARE FROM LARRY. AFTER HOUR'S 2W-P (Larry Wier, USA)

For this flower 'Arctic Char' was used because of its perianth, and 'Spritely' because of its good pink color. Perianth segments are flat and of very good substance with inner petals spade shaped. Cup is gently expanding with a very good intense color for an early pink in Michigan. Stems are tall. Dr. Reed selected this one from a fairly large number of seedlings from my cross. Was Wier 90-5 **Name Pending**

Arctic Char x Spritely Early Season \$15.00

AMIMAL CRACKERS 2 Y-YW-WWY (Larry Wier, USA)

This name was chosen from the Marx Brothers as only they would mix sweets and liquor, the parents of this beautiful blossom. The perianth segments are very found and large. The medium sized cup expands slightly to the mouth where it is flanged. As with most reverses, it opens all yellow and takes time to mature with the small yellow rim. A show flower. Was seedling 88- 2. Resists rot well so far.

(Lemon Candy x Gin and Lime) Midseason \$10.00

FLASHPOINT 1W-P (Larry Wier, USA)

The white perianth with ovate segments of good substance are the background for a trumpet that tapers gradually making for a more massive corona. This trumpet is darker pink inside and has a fairly heavy frill at the mouth. A climate milder that Michigan's will result in bigger and better colored flowers. A vigorous grower here (This was the "flash point" that Larry needed to start registering his daffodils. Almost a red-pink in the best of years—JR)

(Magician x Melancholy) Midseason \$ 10.00

MAKER'S MARK 1Y-O (Larry Wier, USA)

This is Larry's most successful cross so far to get a better colored show flower here in the orange trumpets. The strong yellow color of the overlapping perianth is a good foil to the cylindrical shaped corona with little expansion of the trumpet. The perianth is not starry nor widely overlapping but very pleasing. The stems are tall and strong with bulbs having good increase. Breeding both 1 and 2 Y-Os. A well-grown specimen won the Single Bloom 1 Y-O class at the National ADS Show in St. Louis, beating Magic Lantern. Was Wier 87-1. Proving to be a good parent for Peter Ramsay.

(Glenfarclas x Trumpet Call) Midseason

MERLIN'S PAL 3W-YYO (Charles Wheatly, USA)

This flower is another tribute to Charlie's breeding skill. Blossoms are quite large, bigger than both parents. Tall flower stems in the field makes these bright showy blossoms easy to find. This division 3 small cup has size and beauty to spare. Was seedling 89-98-1.

(Merlin x Palmyra) Midseason \$12.00

MINERAL WELLS (previously WINTER MOON) 1W-Y (Larry Wier, USA)

This white perianth is quite rounded with spade-shaped segments (no double triangles here). The medium bright lemon trumpet has length to spare making for a good bicolor blossom. The corona is more narrow than average with a frill at the mouth. Color has been good in Michigan's climate. Was Seedling # 89-3

(Tudor Dance x Helsal) Midseason \$ 9.00

OUTER RIM 1W-W (Larry Wier, USA)

This flower has inherited the best characteristics of both of its parents. Especially a true and pure white color. Inner petals are spade shaped and almost touching. The trumpet is expanding to a moderate flange that is slightly frilled.

Is stocky in overall shape. This blossom was the real star of seven selections form this cross. Seedling number 91-4.

(Pitchroy x Lady Slim) Midseason \$ 10.00

PINK SUNDAY 2W-P (Charles Wheatly, USA)

The red-pink color of this bowl-shaped cup against the rounded and wide petaled perianth of this flower is its major attraction. Refrain as the seed parent has provided form. Artful as the pollen parent has added to a beautiful cup color. (Was Seedling # 91-82-13).
